Older Americans Act

Signed into federal law in 1965

Established federal Administration on Aging

Created State Units on Aging

California Department of Aging

Area Agencies on Aging established by 1973 Amendments

2020 Reauthorization of Older Americans Act signed into law on March 25, 2020, funding programs through 2024

Fresno-Madera Area Agency on Aging

Formed in 1980 as a Joint Powers Authority

Joint Powers Entities:

County of Fresno, County of Madera, City of Fresno

15 Member Governing Board

1 Elected Official & 4 Appointees from each Joint Power Entity

21 Member Advisory Council

7 Members from each Joint Power Entity appointed by Governing Board

Agency on Aging Goals

Reduce **hunger and increase food security** of older adults who are experiencing barriers to good nutrition

Maintain the ability of older adults to **live independently** for as long as possible

Address **basic needs and rights of older adults who are the most frail and vulnerable** to promote aging with dignity and ensure a safe living environment

Empower older adults to make informed decisions and sound choices to **increase independence and ensure quality of life through connection to resources**

Agencies on Aging must allocate Title III B funding in adequate proportion to one or more services in each of three categories:

Targeting Priorities

Adults age 60 and over:

With **greatest economic need** (with particular attention to older minority individuals with low income and older individuals residing in rural areas);

With **greatest social need** (with particular attention to older minority individuals with low income and older individuals residing in rural areas);

At risk for institutional placement;

With **severe disabilities;**

With **limited English proficiency;** and

With **Alzheimer's disease and related disorders** with neurological and organic brain dysfunction (and the **caretakers of such individuals**).

Multipurpose Senior Services Program (MSSP)

- Case Management program for age 65+ who qualify for Medi-Cal & are medically certified for placement
- MSSP helped 262 older adults most at risk for institutionalization avoid placement in 2022
 - Funded through Centers for Medicare & Medicaid (CMS)

Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program (HICAP)

- Provides unbiased help in choosing Medicare plan that best meets each older adult's unique needs
- 1,354 Medicare beneficiaries counseled in fiscal year 2021-2022
 - Funded through mix of federal State Health Insurance Program and State funds
